# PAEDIATRIC PLAN A BLOCKS **Dorsal Penile**

INDICATIONS: Circumcision, distal hypospadias repair.

TARGET:

Bilateral Dorsal Nerves of the penis (DNP) lying deep to Buck's fascia (BF)
DNP often not visible hence aim to surround the dorsal penile artery (DPA) with LA

LOCAL: 0.5% levobupivacaine up to 5 ml each side 0.1 – 0.2 ml/kg total

#### KIT

- PPE (droplet precautions)
- Gloves
- Linear US probe and cover
- Sterile gel
- 0.5% chlorhexidine
- 50mm 22G NRfit block needle
- Syringe for LA

#### **PRE-PROCEDURE**

- Assistant, monitoring (ECG, Sp02, BP) & IV access
- Usually under general anaesthesia in a paediatric patient
- Operator on right side of patient if right hand dominant
- US machine on contralateral side
- Patient supine
- Aseptic skin prep (allow to dry)







# **EXAMPLE TIMINGS**

- Intra-operative analgesia usually achieved in 10 min
- Analgesia for 12-24 hours post block

# SCANNING

- Initial scan with US probe transverse at base of penis below pubic symphysis
- Increase gain and tilt toward abdomen to optimise image
- Identify dorsal arteries, BF and Corpus Cavernosum (CC) below pubic symphysis

# CAUTION

- Avoid LA containing vasopressors
- Risk of haematoma
- Risk of IV injection and local anaesthetic systemic toxicity

### **STOP BEFORE YOU BLOCK**

(Follow Prep, Stop, Block)

- Introduce needle in plane, through Buck's fascia and superficial to CC
- Low pressure injection (<15cm H20) of LA after negative aspiration
- Ensure bilateral spread, advance needle if not, taking care to avoid dorsal penile vein (midline)
- Perform superficial infiltration of ~2ml LA (ring block) on the ventral aspect of the base of the penis
