Interview with Dr Guy Weinberg



ESRA Updates: What was your earliest ambition?

Guy Weinberg: I wanted the life of a tortured artist - probably the influence films like, Lust for Life, Agony and the Ecstasy and Moulin Rouge. Early on I could think of no higher calling but I soon recognized a substantial talent gap stood in the way of achieving that goal. That's when the opening credits to the American TV medical drama, Ben Casey, caught my attention (see it here: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=juN1mgR3VBQ) - I was a sucker for the philosophical opening but the gurney crashing through swinging doors (at 18 seconds) sealed the deal - here was a job that mattered! I'm still waiting to crash a gurney through those doors.

ESRA Updates: What was your best career move?

Guy Weinberg: Undoubtedly that was making the switch to anesthesiology almost a decade after graduating medical school. It was the result of encouragement from friends like Dr. Lydia Cassorla and mentors like Dr. Hillary Don. I finally recognized that the best path is the one that fits your personality. I should've paid more attention to Polonius – better late than never.

ESRA Updates: What was the worst mistake in your career?

Guy Weinberg: No mistakes, only learning opportunities.

ESRA Updates: How is your work-life balance?

Guy Weinberg: My wife said, laughing loudly, "What balance"? From my perspective, I've experienced what I'll name 'The 40-60 paradox'. At 40, I looked forward to retiring in ten years but by 60 my goal had changed to hoping I could work another ten. The trend has continued and now at 67 I look forward to continued productivity, hopefully by something entirely new.

ESRA Updates: To whom would you most like to apologise?

Guy Weinberg: Any patients I may have harmed. I'm thinking first (among others) of the elderly, severely hypothermic woman I saw in the San Francisco General Mission Emergency Room. I was two-weeks out of medical school and running my first code (it was a long time ago). Her heart rate was <20 and I ordered atropine. No need to say more except that I learned a lot from the experience and still think of it often.

ESRA Updates: What living doctor do you most admire, and why?

Guy Weinberg: There are too many to pick just one. I have a strong list of several dozen exemplars that I strive to emulate or wish I could. [Just a few: Vince Chan, a guiding light and mentor; Santhanam Suresh, a tireless leader and teacher; Roger Johns, a superb scientist and, like David Stone, a great friend; Joe Neal, an outstanding communicator and collaborator; Ron Albrecht and David Schwartz, exemplify supportive leadership; and Michael Fettiplace, a former student who continues to teach me.]

ESRA Updates: Who is the person you would most like to thank, and why?

Guy Weinberg: That's easy..... my wife, Mary. She effectively balances my deficiencies, especially in the realm of common sense. I value her opinion on topics major and minor. She's a highly skilled RN and if you'd seen her manage a critically ill passenger on a recent flight we took, you'd know what I mean.



ESRA Updates: What single unheralded change has made the most difference in your field in your lifetime?

Guy Weinberg: The biggest changes have been well-publicized (heralded?): acceleration of literature search by several orders of magnitude; ultrasound guidance of vascular access and nerve blocks have improved patient safety. However, the single biggest change that few people discuss is the quantum leap in image quality and resolution when fiberoptics were upgraded to CCD cameras in bronchoscopes and video-laryngoscopes. Improved management of difficult airways has made my job easier and safer.

ESRA Updates: What new technology or development are you most looking forward to?

Guy Weinberg: OK, I'm going to dream a bit here. We need a method of breaking the demand for continual keyboarding. The burden of compliance currently takes our attention away from patients and their care. I guess the answer is verbal documentation with either voice recognition or a new class of professional scribes. Either way, let's get back to seeing the patient!

ESRA Updates: What book should every doctor read?

Guy Weinberg: Parkinson's Law. Famous for the law that says, "Work expands to fill the time available" it also explains the persistence and propagation of bureaucracy – valuable to understanding the modern workplace.

ESRA Updates: What is your guiltiest pleasure?

Guy Weinberg: Mint chip ice cream. Enjoying an episode of Fleabag. Doing both at the same time.

ESRA Updates: Where are or when were you happiest?

Guy Weinberg: Sharing a new city or travel experience with my wife is number one. Kayaking on a quiet lake in a beautiful setting is number two.

ESRA Updates: What personal ambition do you still have?

Guy Weinberg: I hope to continue making meaningful contributions, both clinical and scientific and to remain relevant. Right now, I do that best by organizing and co-hosting with Dr. John Lamar (Albany Medical Center) an annual meeting at the Telluride Science Research Institute. The workshop focuses on the transcription activating factors, YAP and TAZ - highly conserved paralogous proteins that promote key biologic features of cancer cells.

ESRA Updates: If you were given £1m what would you spend it on? **Guy Weinberg:** Scientists and laboratories doing YAP/TAZ research.

VIDEOCOMPETITION BILBAO 2019

 $ar{\mathsf{V}}$ ideos are by far the most successful content in today's media landscape. Educational videos are among the most effective tools for training. Videos are used widely as self-improvement tools and as CME materials in regional anaesthesia and pain medicine techniques. ESRA applauds the passion and commitment of our many members who produce educational videos and recognize the need to standardize the quality and structure of the videos. ESRA Educational Video Competition has completed its 3rd edition during the 2019 annual ESRA Congress in Bilbao. The international jury has selected 7 videos among the 22 that have been submitted from 11 countries. Before a well-attended session in Bilbao, these videos were shown and discussed. For the first time, the choice of the three finalists was decided by the audience using a televoting systems: "Ultrasound Assisted Lumbar L5-S1 Transforaminal Block" by Sergi Boada Pie (Hospital Joan XXIII, Tarragona, Spain), "Peng Block" by Raffaele Russo (IRCCS Casa Sollievo della Sofferenza Foggia, Italy) and "Essentials in Ultrasound Guided Regional Anaesthesia" by Emma Pack (Royal National Orthopaedic Hospital, Stanmore, United Kingdom). We are quoting just the first author, but most videos have been submitted by an enthusiastic team. The fateful sentence "And the winner is..." was pronounced during the Gala Dinner, held in the astonishing Guggenheim Museum in Bilbao. Dr. Grossi, on behalf of the Jury has awarded Sergi Boada Pie (with Patricia Alfaro-De La Torre and Monir Kabiri-Sacramento) as the winner of the competition. Second and third places were attributed to the teams of Rafaele Russo and Maria Paz Sebastian, respectively.



EDRA 2019 Diplomats





Figure 1. EDRA candidates

Luropean Diploma in Regional Anaesthesia and Acute Pain Management will celebrate 15 years of existence in 2020. With the dedicated leadership of Alan Borgeat and José Aguire over 2000 candidates sat EDRA Part 1 and almost 1000 candidates got examined for EDRA Part 2 (figure 1).




Figure 3. EDRA candidates by continent

This year EDRA part 1 took place in Riyadh (Saudi Arabia - 19 candidates), Coimbatore (India - 72 candidates), Cape Town (South Africa) and Bilbao (ESRA Congress, Spain - 140 candidates). For the first time EDRA Part 1 exam was offered in Spanish language during ESRA Espana congress in Brugos. Part-2 exam is only offered in English language at the moment and 131 candidates underwent the oral examination this year. The average pass rate for the exam over the years has been 68.8% for Part-1 and 81.1% for Part-2 (figure 2). This year's results in Bilbao were similar - pass rate for Part-1 67% and Part-2 75%. Part -1 exam in Spanish language in Brugos wen also very well (we had 19 candidates) with pass rate of 68%. The exam has become very popular not only among European anaesthesiologists, but also for people from Asia, Africa & Middle East, America and other countries (figure 3). Next year we plan to run the exam in Saudi Arabia, India, Greece (ESRA congress in Thessaloniki) in English and in other centres in Spanish and Turkish language. There are some new developments regarding workshop requirements for EDRA exam in the future. You will be informed in advance about any changes to make appropriate arrangements.









ESRA 2019 in Social Media

he 38th annual ESRA congress was special in several aspects. One of them was the number of #SoMe impressions. Total impressions across 3 platforms were 10,848,832 while onsite the focus is Twitter as that is the main platform where participants mostly engage with a total of 10.69 Million. ESRA's 2019 environmental impact

SRA is deeply committed to organize sustainable and eco-friendly events and made an estimate on the environmental impact of that policy for the annual congress in Bilbao. A rough estimate of the numbers adds up to the following:

- Plastic cups not used: 15,000 (45 kg)
- Plastic bottles not used: 1,000 (14.31 kg)
- Roll ups recycled: 36 (180 kg)
- No disposable bedding during pre-event workshops (about 1 kg)

So, a total of 240.31 kg of plastic and non-recyclables avoided the landfill and total amount of 1,441.86 kg of CO2 emissions were avoided.

PROSPECT

Optimal pain management before, during and after surgery is extremely important for patient satisfaction but more importantly is essential for enhanced recovery after surgery. Despite published evidence-based guidelines from several professional groups, postoperative pain management remains inadequate and the guidelines and recommendations from professional groups and bodies are flawed in various ways. The procedure-specific pain management (PROSPECT) collaboration consists of anaesthetists and surgeons with broad international representation that provide healthcare professionals with practical and evidence-based recommendations formulated in a way that facilitates clinical decision-making across all stages of the perioperative period on a procedure-specific basis. In a recent publication in Anaesthesia (Anaesthesia 2019 doi:10.1111/anae.14776) the PROSPECT methodology is explained in detail. PROSPECT is original because it discusses more than just drugs and analgesic interventions, it also addresses surgical aspects and not only looks at efficacy of interventions but also at side-effects. The collaboration of anaesthetists and surgeons makes the recommendations unique.

PROSPECT guidelines are also translated into various different languages (Mandarin, Portuguese, Japanese, German, Spanish, etc...).

PROSPECT is an independent Working Group within ESRA. Its members are Marc Van de Velde (Chair), Eric Albrecht, H. Beloeil, F. Bonnet, Alain Delbos, G. P. Joshi, P. Lavand'homme, P. Lirk, E. Pogatzki-Zahn, N. Rawal, J. Raeder, Axel Sauter, S. Schug, S. Freys (surgeon), D. Lobo (surgeon), H. Kehlet (surgeon).

In depth information on members of the PROSPECT group, the methodology and the procedures on which guidelines and recommendations have been formulated can be found on the website postoppain.org. Detailed information on the recommendations itself can also be found on the same website.

The most recent recommendation that was published is on Rotator Cuff repair and was published in 2019 in Anaesthesia (Anaesthesia 2019, DOI:10.1111/anae.14796).
